

How the microchipping system works

1 Ask your vet to implant a BackHome® Bioglass Mini Transponder in your pet.

2 Complete the registration form with your veterinarian at the time of microchipping.

Your pet's unique identification number can be registered with your contact details on a New Zealand national registry for the life of your pet.

3 Update your contact details if they change.


It's important you tell the registry if you move house or change phone number, so they can find you if your pet is lost.

If your pet becomes lost

1 Veterinarians, rangers and animal welfare shelters have microchip scanners. Scanning will reveal your pet's unique BackHome® microchip identification number.

2 The identifier then contacts the national registry and quotes the microchip number, which gives them access to your details as the pet's owner.

3 You'll be informed your pet has been found so you can bring them back home.

Veterinary clinics, dog wardens, and animal shelters have scanners that can read microchip numbers.

There are a number of microchip registers available to pet owners for registering their animal's microchip.

> **The National Dog databank**

As of the 1st of July 2006 all new puppies must be microchipped and have their microchip number registered with the local council on the National Dog Databank

> **New Zealand Companion Animal Register**

The New Zealand Companion Animal Register is accessible to vets, animal shelters and dog wardens 24 hours a day every day of the year (online) and via a free phone number during the day.
